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Birmingham lecturer longlisted for Booker Prize

The Kills by Dr Richard House, Department of English, has been included on the 2013 Man Booker Prize long list. The Kills is a digital first – a novel in four parts, all released at first as enhanced ebooks which contain rich audio, visual, and web content created by Dr House to support and extend the text-based narrative. The physical book was released in July 2013. The shortlist will be announced on 10 September, further details on The Kills are on the University website.



Humphreys Lecture 2013 – Sir Paul Nurse

Venue: Leonard Deacon Lecture Theatre, Medical School Sir Paul Nurse, Chief Executive and Director of the Francis Crick Institute and President of the Royal Society, will present this year's Humphreys Lecture titled 'Controlling the Cell Cycle'. Sir Paul was honoured with a knighthood for services to cancer research and cell biology in 1999, and awarded the Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine in 2001. University Professor ranked in 'Hottest Research of 2012'

Professor Gregory YH Lip, Professor of Cardiovascular Medicine, has been ranked amongst the Science Watch 'Hottest Research of 2012'. This annual ranking is based on bibliographic research and recognises researchers whose recent published papers recorded notably higher levels of citations than the previous year. Participants needed

- School of Psychology questionnaire: Parents of children aged 4–11 with, and without, autism spectrum disorders are required to complete an electronic <u>questionnaire</u> to compare eating behaviours of typically developing children and children diagnosed with ASD.
- £10 cash study: CANTAB, a computerised test, is being used to study cognitive processes. The study involves one hour-long session that incorporates a questionnaire and simple CANTAB tests. Volunteers need to be healthy, adult, native English speakers, aged over 40. For details contact Iraida Neira.
- Bereavement study: This study aims to improve the evaluation of end of life care in the UK, and is seeking participants who have been bereaved in the last 6–24 months, or know somebody currently receiving end of life care.
