### Pay negotiations update

- Academic and related staff eligible staff on grade 6 and above have had their salary increased by a 1% pay award from 1 August 2012. Back-pay was included in December pay.
- Support staff on bands 100 to 500 pay negotiations with local branches of Unite, Unison and GMB were due to begin on 21 May 2012, but did not due to a dispute over the 2011 pay settlement. The dispute is now resolved and pay negotiations for 2012 have recently commenced. More news on support staff pay discussions will follow in the New Year.

#### Easier access to timetables and room bookings

Staff in Academic Services and IT Services have worked together to improve access to timetable information and room booking systems. The government of Guangzhou, one of the most important cities in mainland China, has named Professor KK Cheng, of the College of Medical and Dental Sciences, as an honorary citizen. Professor Cheng has led the University's academic interests in its most significant engagement in China to date, The University of Birmingham Guangzhou Centre, a landmark partnership between the University and the Guangzhou Municipal Government.
