Bigging up society? Evidence, assertion and policy in debates about the UK's third sector

Date/time: Wednesday 13 May, 4.30-6.00pm

Beyond the direct impacts of voluntary action and voluntary organisations themselves on their beneficiaries, claims are also made about the wider public benefits of a strong voluntary sector. ICCS Seminar Series: Take a Chance – Trust Building Across Identity Groups

Date/time: Thursday 14 May, 5.00pm **Venue**: Room 420, Muirhead Tower

Professor Andrew Kydd, University of Wisconsin, will be speaking at this Institute of Conflict, Cooperation and Security (ICCS) event. Trust is central to cooperation and it is often taken for granted that trust is higher among members of an identity group than between groups. However, apart from assimilation or creating new overarching identities, we lack a compelling explanation for trust building. In this paper we develop a model for trust building between members of different identity groups that considers the role of ingroup attachment and outgroup hostility, and which is based on taking chances with others in order to observe their behaviour and determine their trustworthiness. ICCS Distinguished Lecture: Violence, Civilization and Humanity

Professor Andrew Linklater, arguably one of the 50 key thinkers writing in the field of International Relations today, argues that the idea of the civilizing process provides students of international relations with an important resource for explaining long-term developments in relations within and between human societies. Water in a changing environment: too much, too little, too hot?

The Inaugural Lecture of David Hannah, Professor of Hydrology and Head of School for Geography, Earth and Environmental Sciences will look to understand how water in our environment responds to climate and how other drivers of change are a major challenge for the hydrological sciences. Too much water (flood), too little water (drought) or water that is too hot (extreme temperature) can have profound consequences for aquatic ecosystems and people. **More information**.

Ya' gotta' love baseball: resource caravan passageways and immigrant integration

Date/time: Thursday 2 July, 5.30–6.30pm **Venue**: G15, Muirhead Lecture Theatre

With Steven E Hobfoll, the Judd and Marjorie Weinberg Presidential Professor, Rush University Medical Center Chicago, Illinois, USA. Personal, social and material resource loss and gain is instrumental in immigrant life and host-immigrant conflict. Using the 'love of baseball' metaphor, which has long been a standard for immigrant acceptance in the United States, Professor Hobfoll will examine demands on both immigrants and society to allow and observe pathways of integration along resource caravan passageways that enable, impede, or disenable integration. **Register to attend**.
